partnership and charter school programs. The Board strongly believes that all children regardless of geography, economic class, or other disposition — deserve a healthy start and a quality education.



I am pleased to present the 2017-2018 Seeds of Health Annual Report. While an annual report cannot capture all of Seeds of Health's daily activities, it does provide an accurate snapshot of the scope and nature of our work as well as the successes we've experienced over the past year.

Since 1983, the staff and administration of Seeds of Health has been dedicated to serving the comprehensive developmental needs of Milwaukee's children and adolescents, and our WIC (Women, Infants and Children) program continues to provide health and nutritional education to over 2,500 clients. With a sustained commitment to growth and expansion, Seeds of Health currently exists as the only K-12 charter school agency in Wisconsin serving 1,325 students in four high schools and a K-8 elementary program. Our five individual and unique education programs serve a broad range of student needs - from the at-risk to the college bound.

The educational opportunities and challenges of the future include focusing on the development of 21st century skills which focus on communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and creativity. Looking ahead to FY 2018-2019, Seeds of Health will take steps to provide students with relevant and technology-based learning environments including multi-media labs at each school, Project Launch at Windlake Elementary, a fabrication lab at Tenor High School, a health career pathways program at MC², computer science

through the TEALS program at our high schools, and numerous new academic and extra-curricular and sports offerings throughout the system.

We are proud of our student outcomes: 100% graduation rate for our 2r schools, 95% attendance rate, standard test scores that meet and exceed the national norms on the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) and state assessments, and on-going opportunities for our families to participate in our programs. Grandview High School, which serves at-risk students, continues to meet the criteria established by the at-risk law. As an agency, we remain committed to providing educational opportunities that will allow our students to blossom as they work to reach their fullest potential and achieve their goals and dreams.


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

The Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) mission is to safeguard the health of low-income women, infants, and children up to age 5 who are at nutrition risk by providing nutritious foods to supplement diets, information on healthy eating, and referrals to health care.





WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) has been managed by Seeds of Health, Inc. since 1983 and currently serves over 2,500 participants. Funded by the United States Department of Agriculture (U.S.D.A.), the WIC program helps promote and maintain the health and well-being of nutritionally at-risk pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women, infants and children.

How WIC serves its clients:

Helps clients at up to 185% poverty including pregnant women, new mothers, and young children up to age five eat well, learn about nutrition, and stay healthy.

Provides supplemental nutritious foods, and nutrition and breastfeeding information.

Promotes and supports breastfeeding.

Aims to effectively help all clients develop their minds and bodies through one-on-one counseling and other interactive communications that center around nutrition.

Makes referrals to doctors, dentists, and programs like Food Stamps, Healthy Start, and Head Start.


Seeds of Health Elementary, which includes Windlake Elementary (grades K4-3) and Windlake Academy (grades 4-8), is a K-8 neighborhood school chartered through the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Opened in 1996, Seeds of Health Elementary serves 435 students.

Students at Windlake exceeded expectations on the 2016-2017 state report card.

Students participated in numerous extra-curricular activities including art club, robotics, technology club, Girls on the Run, science club, soccer, tae kwon do, math club, student council, Seeds of Health Video Productions, and STEMastics.

40 Windlake Academy 7th and 8th graders participated in a five day trip to Washington, D.C. Students from Seeds of Health's high schools (Tenor, Veritas, and MC²) also participated.

The K-8 math curriculum was enhanced to increase math achievement.

The **Grandview High School** mission is to help young adults become academically, emotionally and socially prepared for productive participation in the 21st century.






Grandview High School is a partnership high school established in 1988 and authorized under the Children-at-Risk Law through Milwaukee Public Schools. Grandview currently provides 230 at-risk students in grades 9-12 with the opportunity to finish their high school education.

Extra-curricular activities at Grandview included student council, PEARLS for Teen Girls, Wise Guys, and yearbook club.

Grandview hosted a Family Resource Night for parents to learn more about issues in the community including immigration, opioids, sex trafficking, and services offered by WIC.

MC2 HIGH SCHOOL MILWAUKEE COLLEGE & CAREER HIGH SCHOOL

The Milwaukee College and Career (MC²) High School mission is to empower students to become engaged learners utilizing 21st century tools and resources leading to successful post-secondary opportunities in a global environment.







MC² High School is a public non-instrumentality high school, chartered through Milwaukee Public Schools. Established in 2010, MC² High School serves 190 students in grades 9-12.

Extra-curricular activities at MC² included robotics, art club, student government, PEARLS for Teen Girls, and gaming club which held a chess tournament.

MC²'s robotics team competed in 2 statewide competitions.


Student choir was created in partnership with the Milwaukee Conservatory of Music.

HIGH SCHOOL

The **Tenor High School** mission is to prepare Milwaukee students for successful entry to post-secondary education and career opportunities through the dual completion of a high school diploma and a Milwaukee Area Technical College program certificate or technical diploma, and/or credits in a post-secondary degree program.



Tenor High School is a public charter school authorized through the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. The only school of its kind in Milwaukee, Tenor offers students the opportunity to earn their high school diploma and college credits while attending classes at Milwaukee Area Technical College (MATC) their senior year. Opened in 2005, Tenor High School currently serves 227 students in 9th -12th grade.



Extra-curricular activities at Tenor included poetry club, yearbook, gaming club, art club, student council, and co-ed flag football.

Six Tenor students participated in a dual credit class offered through MATC—in addition to earning one high school math credit, students also earned seven MATC math credits.

Students participated in a program hosted by Local 420 Union of Operating Engineers that introduced students to the skilled trades.

Students participated in TEALS (Technology Education and Literacy in School), a computer science class made possible by Microsoft Philanthropies—volunteers from Northwestern Mutual, CB Richard Ellis, and Rokkin Cat helped to teach the course.



- 7 students are pursuing employment with their certificate or tech diploma earned at MATC.
- 23 seniors will remain at MATC after graduation to continue their studies in fields including aesthetics, animation, audio production, auto collision repair and finish tech, business management, civil engineering tech, EMT, electricity, graphic design, medical assistant, medical laboratory tech, occupational therapy assistant, radiography tech, registered nursing, and surgical tech.
- 13 seniors will transfer the credits earned at MATC to a four year college including Alverno College, Carroll University, Cardinal Stritch University, Marquette University, University of Wisconsin-Madison, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and Wisconsin Lutheran College.









VERITAS HIGH SCHOOL

The **Veritas High School** mission is to prepare Milwaukee students for post-secondary education success through completion of an academically challenging, values-based curriculum in a safe and supportive environment.



Veritas High School was established in 2001 as a college-bound preparatory charter high school. Chartered through the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Veritas serves 252 students in grades 9-12.





2017-2018 MAP Results Windlake Elementary & Windlake Academy







In the fall of 2014, mentor 2.0 began its relationship with Veritas High School by matching its first cohort of freshmen with college educated mentors. 
Seeds of Health has created an excellent reputation for fiscal management, including a long history of unqualified audits by independent, highly reputable audit firms. For fiscal year (FY) 2017-2018, Seeds has a budget of \$14,332,000 for the purpose of operating five separate public school programs and a WIC program. Eighty-six percent of the budgets for all schools is spent on the delivery of the educational programs. The remainder is designated for expenses related to facilities (three owned and three leased) housing the programs.

Seeds of Health owns the facilities that house the following programs: MC² High School located at 131 South 1st Street, Milwaukee; Veritas High School located at 3025 West Oklahoma Avenue, Milwaukee; and Windlake Academy (Grades 4-8) located at 1445 South 32nd Street, Milwaukee. Seeds of Health leases the following facilities: Grandview High School facility - leased from Cleveland Center located at 2745 South 13th Street, Milwaukee; Tenor High School facility - leased from the Archdiocese of Milwaukee located at 840 North Jackson Street, Milwaukee; and Windlake Elementary (Grades K4-3) facility - leased from SS Cyril & Methodius Parish located at 2433 South 15th Street, Milwaukee.

Seeds of Health currently has the following debt:

- 1. Capitalized lease payable to GFC Leasing for acquisition of Agency phone system with a principal balance of \$46,900, which will be paid off in July, 2020.
- 2. Capitalized lease payable to US Bank for acquisition of student Chromebooks with a principal balance of \$73,200, which will be paid off in August, 2019.
- 3. WHEFA Bonds payable to Wells Fargo Bank for refinancing building acquisition and improvement debt with a principal balances totaling \$3,016,500, which will be partially paid in full in November, 2024 with remainder maturing in November, 2027.
- 4. Notes payable to IFF for refinancing building acquisition and improvement debt with principal balances totaling \$1,668,000, which will mature in November, 2022.
